Saint of the Week: St Mary of the Cross



Name: Mary Helen Mackillop Born: 15th January 1842; Melbourne

Died: 8th August 1909; Sydney Feast Day: 8th August Patron Saint of: Australia

Although better known by her baptismal name Mary MacKillop, this saint is referred to in the sacramentary by her professed religious name: "Mary of the Cross". That 'Mary of the Cross' took this name is an insight into her spirituality, and a name that turned out to be biographically prophetic. The entire life of Mary MacKillop was characterised by the mystery of the Cross. Her upbringing was difficult on account of the instability of her father, Alexander MacKillop, who had a gift for bankruptcy that caused Mary from the age of sixteen to become the primary bread-winner for her family. From a very young age she acquired a strong sense of responsibility starting with her immediately family, and extending over the years to the wider needs of the community.

Mary's inspiration to found a new religious order of teaching nuns was in direct response to a pressing need. Catholics had few opportunities to receive a Catholic education. The Victorian Government has a particular long history of anti-Catholic policy-making. In 1872 it issued the Stephens Act which clearly announced its intention to steam-roll any chance of Catholic education. The author of this act declared: "In a couple of generations, through the missionary influence of the State schools, a new body of State doctrine and theology will grow up, and the cultured and intellectual Victorians of the future will directly worship in common at the shrines of one neutral-tinted deity, sanctioned by the State department."

One judge described the Stephens Act as "an endeavour to crush Catholicism under the heel of Authority." The Catholics of the colonial era were accustomed to prejudice and discrimination, but they were not about to roll over and let the faith be wiped out through a State-directed *Kulturkampf*. Mary Mackillop was one of the champions who rose to the occasion, ready to roll up her sleeves and

set about establishing schools for those that the State considered unworthy of educating. Throughout her entire life Mary MacKillop fought tooth and nail to ensure that they *never* received a cent of government money. This may seem strange to modern-day Catholics who are used to fighting *for* government funding. Mary understood with prophetic insight that the moment the government starts funding Catholic schools is the moment that Catholics lose autonomy over the curriculum. Mary would later come to blows with the bishop of Brisbane who tried to force the sisters to accept government money. One wonders what St Mary of the Cross would make of the state of Catholic education in Australia today?

It's hard to summarise the life of Mary because her enterprises were so vast over so many states and in so many domains: establishing convents, schools, orphanages, women's refuges, to say nothing of the countless individuals she helped and counselled. There was the stress of constant debt, and anxiety of her everexpanding apostolate, and the suffering caused by having to deal with unstable, envious and malicious personalities, including nuns, priests and bishops. When one considers everything that Mary undertook, not least the physical demands of trekking from one side of the country to another over the most inhospitable of terrain, it would be heroic for someone with full health to accomplish. Throughout her life Mary was plagued with chronic illness, in particular, debilitating migraines. Everything she undertook sapped her of what little energy she had. She was regularly bed-ridden for days or weeks at a time. Toward the end of her life she suffered from a stroke that left her confined to a wheelchair.

In spite of the trials Mary of the Cross faced on a daily basis, when we examine her life we see an astonishing serenity. Mary could see God's holy Will being accomplished in everything that unfolded, good or bad. May we have the spirit of long-suffering patience to bear the crosses God sends us, trusting always in His holy Will and providential care.
